

100 YEARS AGO -- FROM "THE WEYMOUTH GAZETTE" OF JUNE 14, 1878:

"Seventeen of the Committee chosen at the annual town meeting to consider and report on the subject of division of the town, held a meeting yesterday, at the Town Hall, and a vote was taken on the subject, the result being 10 in favor and seven against. After considerable discussion, Mr. N.D. Canterbury moved that the committee report to the town that it is inexpedient to divide at present and the motion was caried by a vote of 11 to 4."

Strawberry Festivals were held that week by the Ladies Christian Temperance Union, the young ladies of the Universalist Society, the Catholic Church (S.W.) and the Ladies Benevolent Society but accordto the following week's paper the attendance at the last named was small.
