A HOLIDAY CUSTOM: " A delightful custom, still practiced in parts of England and France, is the 'King's Cake' baked on Epiphany day (January 6) in honor of the Magi. A coin is put into the dough before baking and the person who finds it in his piece is the 'king'. In French Canada this cake (Gateau des Rois) contains a bean and a pea, making the respective finders 'king' and 'queen' of the feast. Robert Herrick's 'Twelfe Night' refers to this old custom:
